2. **Compost your food-soiled paper.** This includes pizza boxes, paper towels, and paper plates. Ordering

towels, and paper plates. Ordering in or picking up take out? Waxed cardboard, paper takeout containers, chopsticks, and toothpicks go into your compost, too!

- 3. **Peel off produce stickers.** Produce stickers are not compostable and, if thrown into the compost, contaminates the finished soil amendment. Place stickers in the garbage.
- 4. **Keep your compost kitchen pail clean.** Line your kitchen pail with BPI certified compostable liners, newspaper, or

paper bags, and empty regularly to keep it clean. Don't have a compost pail? You can request one from Recology.

FREE DROP-OFF AT SHOREWAY PUBLIC RECYCLING CENTER

Did you know the Shoreway Public Recycling Center (PRC) accepts select hazardous waste items for FREE from residents? Items that are classified as hazardous waste must be disposed of properly because they contain harmful chemicals that can contaminate our soil, drinking water, and air when disposed of improperly!



These items are accepted for residential drop off at the PRC:



- Batteries (household, lithium ion and car)
- Cell phones
- Compact fluorescent lights (CFLs)
- **Electronics** (computers, TVs, copiers, and other consumer electronics)
- **Fluorescent light tubes** (household only, up to 6 tubes, must be less than 6 feet)
- Latex & oil-based paint (up to 10 gallons)
- Used motor antifreeze (up to 10 gallons)
- Used motor oil (up to 15 gallons) & oil filters
- **Mattresses** (up to 5 mattresses, drop off at the Shoreway Transfer Station)

The PRC is open Monday-Saturday 8:30 a.m. – 4 p.m. at 333 Shoreway Road in San Carlos.
